## TRAVEL INFORMATION

### **By plane**

The most convenient airport is Bologna (IATA code BLQ). However, nearby airports that you may want to consider for transfer by train to Bologna Railway Station, where the conference shuttle could pick you up, are Verona (VRN), Venice Marco Polo (VCE), Treviso (TSF), Firenze (FLR), Forlì (FRL). They are all roughly 1-1,5 hours away from Bologna.

The Organizers offers a free shuttle service from either Bologna Airport or Bologna Railway Station to the conference venue. More details are given in the registration form.

### **By train**

The Conference venue is a 15-minute walk from the Railway Station of Castel S. Pietro Terme. Bologna Central Railway Station is a major hub in the Italian high-speed train network and from there you can enjoy free transfer with the conference shuttle service.
